



## PROTOCOL FOR MANAGEMENT OF NON-BREASTFED INFANTS 0 - 6 MONTHS

**NB:** Breastfeeding is the safest way to feed an infant. All efforts must be taken to protect, promote and support breastfeeding. However, in difficult circumstances, it may be necessary to use infant formula as a last resort. Infants in these special situations are <u>highly</u> vulnerable and must be urgently identified, protected and provided with <u>appropriate</u> support.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR BMS SUPPORT

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Note this rejection should be confirmed by a psychologist oriented on IYCF-E. Bereavement, trauma or emotional crises do not automatically warrant cessation of breastfeeding - restorative care and psychosocial support should be the first step.

Compliant with NAFDAC Marketing of Infant and Young Children Food and Other Designated Products Regulations 2005.

- Labels should state the superiority of breastfeeding
- o Labels should indicate that the products should be used only on medical advice
- o Labels should warn about health hazards of using infant formula
- There should be no pictures idealizing the use of infant formula

Manufactured and packaged in accordance with the Codex Alimentarius standards, CODEX STAN 72-1981

(Re-)labelled in appropriate language (Kanuri / Hausa) with pictorial diagrams

Have a shelf-life of at least 6 months on receipt of supply.

Purchased (NOT DONATED)

Suitable for infants < 6 months

## **REFERRALS**

- Upon discharge: Infants > 6 months must be referred to breastfeeding and / or complementary feeding support and counselling as appropriate.
- o Consider whether Child Protection and / or Psychosocial support is required
